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Series Snapshot:



The Rancher's Legacy is Book 1 in the Homeward Trails series, each of which features a different Cooper sibling as the protagonist. Grandmother Edith Rose wants to see all of her grandchildren before she dies. Her daughter (the children's mother) died twenty years earlier, in the state of New York. On hearing the news, Edith wrote at once to her son-in-law, asking him to bring the children to Maine, but she never heard back from him.

Edith's husband was out to sea when it happened. On his return home, Captain Rose tried to find the children, but he was too late. Abandoned by their father, they'd been sent to an orphanage and then adopted into different families. Now the captain is dead, and Edith is determined to find them. She retains an attorney, who hires a persistent investigator, Ryland Atkins, to bring the three grandchildren home.

Book 1, The Rancher's Legacy, features Matt Anderson, born Zephaniah Cooper.

Book 2, The Corporal's Codebook, features Jack Miller, born Elijah Cooper

Book 3, The Sister's Search, features Molly Weaver, born Jane Cooper.

The Rose Family's Cousin Coins



Does your family have a tradition peculiar to your clan? Captain Rose brought home a cache of special coins from a voyage to China. Each of his grandchildren was given one of the round coins with a square hole in the middle. To the Cooper boys, these become a symbol of the loved ones they've lost and a token of hope that they will find each other again. For little Jane, her coin is a mystery. She was too young to remember her birth family or to ever meet the captain. But the coin was with her when she was adopted, and she knows it's special.

Show or tell about something special in your own family and how you came by it.

Character Cheat Sheet:

Below are some of the most important characters in The Rancher's Legacy. This information can help you keep track as you read and discuss the story.

Matt Anderson:

Adopted son of John Anderson, he was originally named Zephaniah Cooper. He now lives with his dad on a ranch in Colorado. Matt served in the Civil War and was wounded at the Battle of Glorieta Pass. He's mostly healed now, and he hopes to rejoin his unit one day.

Edith Rose: Matt's natural grandmother. She lives in Portland, Maine, and hopes to find her three grandchildren.

Ryland Atkins: The investigator

looking for Matt.

Bud Lassen: Ranch foreman at the Maxwell ranch.

Vida Henry: Housekeeper and cook for the Andersons.

Jeremiah Turner: Edith Rose's attorney; Ryland's boss.

Ben and Catherine Cooper: The birth parents of Zeph, Elijah, and Jane Cooper.

Rachel Maxwell:

The daughter of Bill Maxwell, neighbor of the Andersons, Rachel is returning home from school in the East. She's never seen her father's new ranch, but when Matt takes her there, they find the ranch under attack and the house on fire. She doesn't know that her father and Matt planned for them to get married and combine the two ranches.

Abby Benson: The cousin in Maine whom Matt remembers. She lives with her grandmother, Edith.

Author Q. & A.:

Q: How did you think of the idea for this story?

A: The concept for the series actually occurred to me several years before I wrote it. I tucked the idea away in a file called "Find My Grandchildren." I mulled over it for a while, during which I considered various historical time periods. I thought about having four grandchildren but settled on three. I even considered having one of them move outside the United States with his or her adoptive family, but when I settled on the Civil War era, that seemed a little too complicated. I'm glad the stories are finally seeing daylight, and I hope readers will enjoy them.

Q: How do you choose names for your characters?

A: Most of the names in this book are traditional ones. For the Maine characters, I chose names I'd heard when I lived there. Maine was settled mostly by English people, so I chose names you'll find there. Ryland was the name of a man I actually met in Massachusetts (not Maine, but still New England). It was a surname in his family tree. I loved the name and combined it with Atkins, a not uncommon surname in the area where I grew up. I often use first or last names of people I know in my stories.

Q: Did you have to do a lot of research for this book?

A: Yes, most of my historicals require a great deal of research. For example, all of the Homeward Trails stories involve travel over long distances. But travel was greatly disrupted during the Civil War and grew harder as the war progressed. These books reflect the hardship people experienced then. Book 2, The Corporal's Codebook, took the most research of the three, because it involves a lot of details concerning the military and telegraphy. I spent many hours studying on the internet and with about two dozen books dealing with the Civil War era.

Discussion Questions for The Rancher's Legacy:

- 1. Did you find Rachel stuck-up in the first chapter? Was she fair to Matt? Would you advise Matt to be more forthcoming about his and Rachel's fathers' plans?
- 2. Did Matt make the right decision in sending Rachel off alone with the wagon toward his father's ranch?
- 3. Should Rachel trust her father's judgment about Matt and go along with his plan?
- 4. What do you think of Vida's treatment of Rachel? Considering her position and her husband's on the ranch, do you think Mr. Anderson would be wise to set some rules for her?
- 5. Does Matt really want to rejoin his regiment, or is he feeling guilty for leaving it? If you were his friend, would you encourage him to keep trying, or to let it go?
- 6. Do you think the men of the two ranches did enough to protect Rachel (and Vida)? What more could they do? Is Rachel careless of her safety? Is she too headstrong?
- 7. Could Rachel have succeeded in winning Vida over if she took another approach to their relationship? What would you suggest?
- 8. Ryland is somewhat of a greenhorn on his first journey west. Can you come up with a few simple tips that would have made his travels safer and easier?
- 9. Rachel can't seem to make up her mind on whether to stay in Colorado Territory or go back east and teach school. What do you think? What would you do if you were in her place?
- 10. Can you think of ways Matt could try to find his siblings?
- 11. In chapter 18, Matt recalls the battle when he was wounded. What resources are available to the military now that weren't at that time? How do the people around Matt try to help him? What else could they do to aid him mentally and emotionally?
- 12. What do you think of Vida's birthday observance? Do you have a difficult person in your life? How can you honor them without offending them?
- 13. When Ryland was captured, could he have done anything to lessen his chances of being hurt?
- 14. Ryland is trying to find the grandchildren before Edith Rose dies. When he learns of Matt's military service and battle wound, he realizes that even though the Cooper children are much younger than Mrs. Rose, one or all of them could already be dead. In chapter 23, he confronts the possibility of his own death and prays. What do you think of his prayer?
- 15. Did Matt and Rachel choose the future for themselves that you would have? If you were the author, would you end this book differently?

Fun Facts and Free Bookmarks:

- Matt was wounded in the Battle of Glorieta Pass in New Mexico, which took place on March 28, 1862. I placed him in the 1st Colorado Infantry, which played a major role in the battle.
- The first railroad didn't come to Colorado until 1870, which means travel in this mountainous territory was slow and dangerous.
- The Colorado Territory, with the same boundaries as the present-day state of Colorado, was organized after the Pikes Peak Gold Rush. It was signed into being by President James Buchanan on Feb. 28, 1861. Before that, portions of the territory had been part of the Kansas Territory, the Nebraska Territory, the New Mexico Territory, and the Utah Territory.
- After the Civil War, statehood was sought, but President Andrew
 Johnson vetoed it in 1865. President Ulysses S. Grant favored Colorado
 statehood, though not all of Congress agreed with him. Colorado was
 finally admitted to the Union in 1876.
- The Rancher's Legacy is a finalist in the Will Rogers Medallion contest.
 This award is given for excellence in western fiction. Will Rogers was a famous humorist, cowboy, social commentator, and actor from Oklahoma. Here are a few of my favorite Will Rogers quotes:

"Never miss a good chance to shut up."

"Everyone is ignorant, only on different subjects."

"When I die, I want to die like my grandfather who died peacefully in his sleep. Not screaming like all the passengers in his car."

"When you find yourself in a hole, quit digging."
